



Ensure Success for All Students

Students in Rainbow Schools made significant gains on reading, writing and math assessments administered in the 2005-2006 school year. Results released by the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) confirmed that learning and teaching strategies are having a positive impact on student achievement.

In the elementary panel, the most significant gains were in the area of writing. In the secondary panel, there was a marked improvement in Grade 9 Math. A comparison of the same

EQAO results are one tool for assisting schools and boards in identifying areas for continuous improvement. They provide a measure of how well students understand the expectations outlined in The Ontario Curriculum. Student assessment is most effective when data are interpreted in context, examined over time to determine trends in performance, and used to inform professional dialogue and school improvement planning.

EQAO assessment results are reported in two ways – "All Students" and "Participating Students". The "All Students" method reports results that are based on all students registered in the program. The "Participating Students" method excludes students in the "exempt" and "no data" categories of the assessment. ** We continue to focus on the development of literacy skills as we look to increase the number of students reaching the provincial standard.



Literacy learning

Rainbow District School Board continued to be a lead board in literacy learning. Junior literacy lead teacher training and Grade 5 shared reading training was completed in 2005-2006. Shared reading is an important component of literacy instruction along with reading aloud, guided reading and independent reading.

The Success for All literacy project was launched in 18 schools in 2005-2006 and expanded to all elementary schools in 2006-2007. Through team teaching, literacy resource teachers are building capacity in reading and writing in the classroom. Teachers are working collaboratively during literacy blocks and dialoguing as professional learning teams.

Tracking boards are also being used to monitor student progress. Ongoing reading assessments help teachers make daily decisions about classroom practice, enabling them to adjust instructional strategies to meet the needs of all students. In addition, schools are engaging parents/guardians and the community at large in literacy learning through family reading nights, literacy days, drama presentations and special events.

Writing conversations



Teachers from SK to Grade 6 in 20 Rainbow schools participated in Writing Conversations. Teachers and consultants worked collaboratively to review the instructional approaches outlined in the Ministry's *Guide to Effective Instruction in Writing* and determine the strengths and area of focus related to writing instruction in their school. Teachers also familiarized themselves with

the *Lucy Calkins Units of Study in Primary Writing*, a kit which was introduced to kindergarten teachers during the Professional Learning Day on October 21, 2005.

Grade 4 writing lighthouse

In April 2006, all Grade 4 teachers in Rainbow Schools had the opportunity to visit a lighthouse classroom to observe a class in action during the writing block. Teachers then worked in collaboration to review areas of strength in their own writing program and share strategies for moving writing instruction forward in their classroom.



Junior numeracy lead teacher training

Following a half day in-service on the revised Ontario Mathematics Curriculum to ensure teachers were familiar with the new emphasis on process expectations in mathematics, junior numeracy lead teachers and special education resource teachers participated in four days of numeracy training. The focus was on effective mathematics instruction in the junior grades and the *Big Ideas of Number Sense and Numeration*. Each teacher received a support package which included appropriate problem solving activities to engage students in developing concept understanding through the use of manipulatives. Each school also received professional resources related to effective mathematics instruction.

Junior math lesson study project

Six Grade 4 teachers participated in a lesson study research project modeled after the Japanese Lesson Study approach. Teachers had the opportunity to review research on effective practice and student learning in the area of number sense and numeration. They then created a research lesson, which was observed with a focus on student understanding. The lesson was then revised based on the observations. The lesson study model of professional learning allows teachers to act as researchers in order to determine how to best meet the needs of their students.





Student Success Initiative

The Student Success Initiative entered its third year in 2005-2006. Work continued on implementing the four pillars of Student Success – literacy, mathematical literacy, program pathways (independent living, work, apprenticeship, college and university) and community, culture and caring (embedded in all pillars).

Student success teachers

The Ministry of Education provided additional funding for student success teachers in all Rainbow secondary schools. Student success teachers work with school staff to offer extra attention and support when needed to ensure students earn credits to graduate. Together, they provide more options for learning and monitor student progress.

Building a house from A to Z to key

Sudbury Secondary School students built a house under the guidance of experts in the field as part of a new program called TRADES (Technology Relevant Apprenticeship Driven Education for Students) - a first in the community. Grade 11 students earned four credits towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma – two in construction and two in co-operative education. The Board commends Nor-Ont D&D Sudbury Ltd. and Ludger Michel Estates for supporting this 2005-2006 Innovation Fund initiative.



Special education transition sessions

Rainbow District School Board secondary schools hosted open houses to highlight pathways for Grade 8 students with special needs. Staff provided assistance to students and their parents/ guardians to determine the most appropriate course level for various learning styles and abilities. Many services are available to support students with their learning and ensure success for all.



Hair and aesthetics lab

A new hair and aesthetics lab opened at Chelmsford Valley District Composite School on February 28, 2006. Students gain skills in hairstyling that meet industry standards. They identify trends, describe scientific and physical processes used in beauty services, learn environmental, health and safety laws, develop strong communication and interpersonal skills, and explore career opportunities.

Learning to 18

Rainbow District School Board launched the Learning to 18 program at Cambrian College for students aged 16 to 18 who have difficulty succeeding in a traditional



secondary school. The alternative setting, with small class sizes and individualized curriculum, enables students to work at their own pace and earn credits towards their secondary school diploma. In 2005-2006, the program was funded by the Province of Ontario's Learning to 18 initiative and Rainbow District School Board.

Family of schools meet

Elementary teachers and secondary teachers met regularly in their family of schools to share knowledge and best practices for the benefit of students. They developed action plans and implemented strategies to ease the transition from Grade 8 to Grade 9.



Build Public Confidence

Schools/staff/partnerships receive provincial and national recognition



MacLeod Public School was named one of Canada's Top 40 Schools in the September 2005 issue of Today's Parent magazine for its Pay It Forward program implemented in 2004-2005, an Innovation Fund initiative.

The Council for Exceptional Children Sudbury Chapter nominated Mary MacGregor, Special Education Resource Teacher at Northeastern Elementary School, for the Teacher of the Year Award for the local region. She was subsequently selected to



receive the distinguished Kenn Kloby Teacher of the Year Award – a provincial honour.



Dona Aubin, Special Education Program Leader at Lively District Secondary School, received the Jean Cutbill Memorial Award for 2005 from the Ontario Council for Children with Behavioural Disorders.

Irene Callaghan of Little Current Public School and Marie Thompson of C. R. Judd Public School received national recognition from Phonic Ear Ltd. for their use of amplification systems and their inclusion of deaf and hard of hearing students in their classrooms.

Rona Knight, a teacher at Sudbury Secondary School, received the S. J. "Jack" Ulan Professional Contribution Award from the Ontario Co-operative Education Association. Sudbury Secondary School has the longest running Co-operative Education Program within Rainbow District School Board.

Ministry staff visited the Sudbury Student Services Consortium to explore successful models of student transportation. Optimization exercises undertaken over the past two years have resulted in a transportation system that is one of the most efficient and cost-effective in the Province of Ontario.

The Police Mkwa Opportunity Education Circle received two awards – the 2005 Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police Community Mobilization Award and the Passport to Prosperity Employer Merit Award.

Character education in action



Sixteen students from Rainbow Schools brought the gift of light to darkened areas of Costa Rica during the 2006 March Break. The students, from Lasalle Secondary School, Manitoulin Secondary School and Lo-Ellen Park

Secondary School, travelled to Costa Rica to deliver and install 40 lighting systems consisting of a solar panel, a pair of LED lights and a battery for each home.

Lockerby Composite School staff and students raised a record \$26,500 for the Northeastern Ontario Regional Cancer Centre. Over the past decade, Lockerby has raised over \$225,000 for cancer research in memory of Laura Cotesta.



Students at Monetville Public School filled close to 100 shoeboxes with teddy bears, school supplies, friendship pins and letters for the children of New Orleans. The boxes were shipped to Estelle Elementary School compliments of Atlas Copco Construction and Mining Canada.

On September 16, 2005, all Rainbow District School Board elementary and secondary schools participated in the Terry Fox Run commemorating the 25th anniversary of his Marathon of Hope. At A.B. Ellis Public School

in Espanola, staff and students raised a record \$21,187.54 for the Terry Fox Foundation in 2005. A.B. Ellis Public School has been participating in the Terry Fox Run for the past nine years. To date, the school has raised an outstanding \$142,385.49 for cancer research.

Students capture top honours

Ian Walker and Scott Denniston from R.L. Beattie Public School won the Pfizer Award and Best Overall project at the 37th annual Sudbury Regional Science Fair. They also won the S.M. Blair Family Foundation Award in the Junior Division



at the Canada-Wide Science Fair held in Saguenay, Québec.



Elyse Labelle, a Grade 8 honours student at Central Manitoulin Public School, won the 2006 Elementary Student of the Year Award at the second annual Ontera Youth Achievement Awards on April 20, 2006. The Sudbury Regional HISTOR!CA Heritage Fair celebrated its 10th anniversary in 2006. Seven students were selected to present their winning projects



at the Provincial HISTOR!CA Heritage Fair that took place in St. Catharines. Tristan Emiry of S. Geiger Public School teamed up with brother Aric to highlight their family's farming heritage over the past 93 years. The project was selected for the National Heritage Fair held in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

Wendy Hayward of the N'Swakamok Alternative School won the grand prize in a national art contest sponsored by BEAHR (Building Environmental Aboriginal Human Resources). Wendy's artwork was reproduced on the cover of a calendar sold throughout Canada.



Confederation Secondary School's Senior Reach for the Top Team won the honour of competing in the provincials in Scarborough in May 2006. The champions and their coaches were Josh Charette, David Scott, Brian Mikkila,



Students from Lo-Ellen Park Secondary School and Lockerby Composite School skied their way to victory at the provincial cross-country skiing championship in February 2006. Lockerby

Composite School's Senior Boys' Ski Team included Sean Kershaw, Matti Little, David Endleman and Jon Hey. Lo-Ellen Park Secondary School's Junior Boys' Ski Team included Russell Hanson, Chris Hey, Sam Merrifield and Robert King. Also at the provincial level, Josh Haslam of Lo-Ellen Park Secondary School earned a gold medal in Track and Field in the Midget Boys' Discus.

Manitoulin Secondary School raised over \$47,000 during its second Relay for Life on June 2, 2006. Lasalle Secondary School held its first annual Canadian Cancer Society Relay for Life event on June 9, 2006, raising close to \$11,000.



Students with special needs displayed their skills in various events at the Challenge Meet held at Laurentian University on June 20, 2006, including Dylan McNamara of Churchill Public School and Wesley Proulx of Markstay Public School.

The halls of Princess Anne Public School were alive with the sound of music on June 7, 2006 when a new drum/percussion program was launched for students with special needs thanks to a \$9,900 contribution from the S'Cool Life Fund.





More than 300 educators from across Ontario were in Greater Sudbury on October 28 and 29 for the 2005 Ontario Association for Geographic and Environmental Education (OAGEE) Conference.

The 49th Annual Conference of the Ontario Council for Exceptional Children was held from October 20 to 22, 2005.

Grade 12 students from Rainbow Schools captured top honours at the 2006 Concours de français held at Laurentian University on May 5, 2006. Lockerby Composite School French Immersion student Natalie



Vojnovic and Lockerby Composite School Core French student Selina Biscaro won bursaries to Laurentian University, presented by Dr. John Lundy, Director of the School of Education.

Provide Sound Leadership

Professional learning in 2005-2006 focused on the theme "Reading to Write. Writing to Learn. Success for All." building on a foundation of "Quality Schools Where Character Counts." Rainbow school leaders continued to use data to inform instructional



practices, implementing innovative teaching strategies to boost student achievement and building professional learning communities to enhance student success.

Professional learning highlights:

- August 31, 2005 "Practical Strategies for Working Effectively with Difficult Students" was the focus of Dr. Jane Bluestein's presentation to launch the 2005-2006 school year.
- September 26 and 27, 2005 Carmel Crévola, an internationally renown educational leader, presented a framework for achieving and sustaining improvement in schools.
- October 21, 2005 Grades 7 to 12 teachers focused on the importance of writing to success in secondary school with guest speaker Maureen Barbieri and took part in workshops on writing across the curriculum. Grades 1 to 6 teachers focused on Consensus Marking of Writing Exemplars. JK and SK teachers reviewed Units of Study for Primary Writing. All teachers are leaders in learning.
- November 17, 2005 and March 23, 2006 Barry O'Connor, the Ministry of Education's Senior Advisor for the Student Success Initiative, talked about leaders' responsibilities to guide students, particularly during times of transition.
- November 25, 2005 Joan Green, a distinguished Canadian educator and administrator, focused on instructional leadership to enhance literacy skills for all students and building capacity in the teaching profession.
- February 3, 2006 Gayle Gregory invited leaders to look at instructional leadership in the context of differentiated instruction.
- March 30, 2006 Dr. Tom Many spoke about "The Power of Professional Learning Communities" as part of the Leaders in Learning Conference, an Innovation Fund initiative.
- May 25, 2006 Renown speaker Todd Whitaker delivered the keynote address on invitational leadership at the Principals' Learning Conference in partnership with northern boards.

System and school leadership

A Student Achievement Team was created in 2005-2006 to support student success in Rainbow Schools. The team was comprised of the Principal of Special Education Programs and Services, the Student Success/Learning to 18 Leader and the Principal of Program, a new position launched in December 2005. The team also included a Managing Information for Student Achievement (MISA) Leader in the second semester of the school year.

In August 2006, the Board welcomed new Superintendents Lesleigh Dye and Sharon Speir. The Board continued to enhance its selection process for Vice-Principals and Principals through the Leadership Assessment Centre.



Arts education

The Board continued to implement recommendations of the Arts Education Task Force initiated in 2004 with a preliminary focus on music. Five itinerant music teachers provided leadership along with a half-time Arts

Education Co-ordinator. The Task Force expanded its focus to drama and visual arts.

Signing of First Nations Educational Service Agreements

Rainbow District School Board and 11 First Nations renewed Educational Service Agreements marked by a signing ceremony held at the Ojibwe Cultural

Foundation on March 7, 2006. In effect from September 2005 to August 2008, the agreements reaffirm Rainbow District School Board's commitment to working with First Nation leaders to enhance student learning in Rainbow Schools.

French Second Language programs

Rainbow District School Board launched a French Second Language Steering Committee to provide leadership and rejuvenate French Immersion and Core French in Rainbow Schools. Since its inception in January 2006, the Committee has made a number of recommendations regarding human resources, instructional resources, cultural events, professional development and marketing/promotion.



Daily physical activity

At least 20 minutes of daily physical activity was introduced in elementary schools as part of the Ministry of Education's Healthy Schools Program. Two itinerant teachers provided leadership in all elementary schools within the Board, sharing activities and strategies for implementation.

Allocate Adequate Resources



Budget 2006-2007

Rainbow District School Board approved a budget of \$155.4 million for the 2006-2007 school year at a special meeting held on July 4, 2006.

The 2006-2007 budget provides the financial framework for the strategic board improvement plan. Updated annually, the plan outlines the strategies to be implemented during the school year in keeping with the Board's vision, mission, values and priorities.

The 2006-2007 budget reflects an increase in provincial funding of \$2 million or 1.5 per cent. In addition to provincial investments in education, students in Rainbow Schools are benefiting from a number of Board initiatives approved for funding once again this year.

This includes money for arts education, computers in schools, strategies to support literacy and numeracy, the early reading intervention program, the Innovation Fund and environmental initiatives. Money was also allocated to cover start up costs for the new JK to Grade 8 French Immersion school in Valley East.

A total of 77 per cent of the budget, \$119.2 million, has been allocated to salaries and benefits for the Board's teaching and non-teaching staff. Ten per cent of the budget will go towards supplies and services, eight per cent to fees and contracts and five per cent to capital and replacement projects in the 2006-2007 school year.

Enrolment at a Glance

- According to official predicted enrolment for the start of the 2006-2007 school year, Rainbow District School Board welcomed 16,442 students in Rainbow Schools when classes resumed on September 5th, 2006.
- In the elementary panel, 9,825 students were enrolled in Rainbow Schools including 7,268 in the English Program and 2,557 in the French Immersion Program.
- In the secondary panel, enrolment was expected to reach 6,617 students including 5,837 in the English Program and 780 in the French Immersion Program.
- Enrolment is calculated as full-time equivalents.
- In the 2006-2007 school year, 836 children entered Junior Kindergarten in Rainbow Schools.
- A total of 890 children enrolled in Senior Kindergarten, which includes the Literacy Enriched Activity Program (LEAP).
- A total of 1,475 students registered for Grade 9 classes in area Rainbow Schools.
- Official enrolment data is recorded at the end of October.

Rainbow Schools: Sudbury, Espanola, Manitoulin

Rainbow District School Board provides quality education to students in Sudbury, Espanola and Manitoulin in 40 elementary schools and 9 secondary schools.

The Board also operates educational programs at the Ruth MacMillan Centre, Senga House, Frank Flowers School, Cecil Facer Secondary School, Alta Centre and Learning to 18 Cambrian College.

In Rainbow Schools, programs focus on academic excellence and character education for all students from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12 in English, Core French and French Immersion.

Quality programs, caring teachers, and a nurturing environment where character counts combine to make Rainbow Schools great places to learn.

Starting Point

The 2005-2006 expenditure budget was used as the base for the 2006-2007 budget, adjusted:

- to exclude one-time budget allocations
- to include inflationary pressures such as increased utility costs
- to include contractual/statutory increases due to collective agreements
- to reflect the impact of enrolment projections on staffing
- to allow for the implementation of the 2006-2007 Special Education Plan

The 2005-2006 revenue budget was used as the base for the 2006-2007 budget, adjusted:

to reflect 2006-2007 funding from the Province based on projected enrolment

Did you know?

The Province of Ontario determines funding allocations for school boards.

Funding is provided by the Ministry of Education through a series of grants.

When approving its budget, Rainbow District School Board must work within the funding limitations established by the Province.

Funding intended for education in the classroom cannot be spent in non-classroom areas.

School boards must balance their budgets on an annual basis.

School boards are mandated to deliver curriculum/programs to students within the funding provided by the Province.

2006-2007 Budget Overview

- Funding has been provided for the ongoing implementation of strategies to support literacy and numeracy in Rainbow Schools.
- In 2006-2007, Rainbow Schools received an additional \$690,000 to reduce primary class sizes – the third year of a four-year initiative. This will result in a further increase of 12 teachers (FTE) in JK to Grade 3.
- More prep time is being provided to elementary teachers in accordance with the second year of the collective agreement.
- Work begun by the Arts Education Task Force in September 2004 is continuing in the area of music, dance and drama. A full-time Arts Education Co-ordinator is providing ongoing leadership. A part-time itinerant music teacher is visiting elementary schools to build capacity for arts education. A new itinerant teacher for visual arts is contributing to this initiative.

- Rainbow District School Board received ongoing funding for student success teachers in secondary schools. The Student Success Initiative remains a priority in Grades 7 to 12 to ensure success for all.
- The Computers Task Force is implementing projects that advance the use of technology in Rainbow Schools.
- The Managing Information for Student Achievement project is enabling the Board to better use data to inform professional practice.
- eSIS, the Board's new student information system, has been introduced system-wide. A programmer has been hired to provide assistance to schools. In addition, phase two of a three-year plan to purchase computers for teachers is being implemented. Teacher release is being provided to support the implementation.
- The final phase of the threeyear secondary school network infrastructure upgrade is being completed.
- The Innovation Fund is entering a third year.

- Funding has been provided to support "Learning to 18" lighthouse projects at Manitoulin Secondary School, Chelmsford Valley District Composite School, Sudbury Secondary School and Espanola High School.
- The Board is investing in system-wide activities that provide experiential learning for students, including the Technological Skills Competition, the Entrepreneurship Fair, the Science Fair and the Heritage Fair.
- Funding has been provided for the start up of the new French Immersion JK to Grade 8 school currently being built on the site of Valley View Public School.
- Funding has been provided for the ongoing implementation of the Dearness Conservation program.
- The phone system at the Board Office is being upgraded over the next four years. The "Synre Voice" parent notification system in schools is also being upgraded.
- Outdoor playing fields are being upgraded in elementary and secondary schools.

Overview of Facilities

Since 1998, Rainbow District School Board has significantly consolidated its facilities to ensure the most effective and efficient use of space. This means less money is spent on facilities and



more money is channeled directly into the classroom, where it will benefit students the most.

The following figures do not include programs operated at the Ruth MacMillan Centre, Cecil Facer Secondary School, Senga House, Alta Centre, Learning to 18 Cambrian College and Frank Flowers School.





Maintain Safe Schools

Character education

Lansdowne Public School teamed up with the Social Planning Council to build a more inclusive school community. Work began in a single classroom and has now expanded into a school-wide character building initiative with positive results.

A number of students at Little Current Public School, A.B. Ellis Public School and Webbwood Public School completed three years of training in advanced leadership skills as participants in the Community Builders Program. Community Builders fosters a school environment where diversity is welcomed, leadership in young people is valued, and educators are appreciated.



Students from Wembley Public School, Lansdowne Public School, MacLeod Public School and Wanup Public School were captivated by "Danny King of the Basement", an awardwinning play that focused on

the impact of homelessness and poverty on children and families.

The Roots of Empathy character education initiative was piloted in Rainbow Schools in 2005-2006. Each participating class "adopts" a baby who visits the classroom, along with his/her parent and a trained Roots of Empathy instructor, once a month for a full

school year. As the children observe the parent-infant interaction and follow the baby's development, they learn how infants grow and develop. They also learn to understand a baby's temperament, to observe a



baby's facial cues, to identify feelings and to effectively parent. In the process, they learn to be compassionate and caring citizens of the world. The program was expanded to all Rainbow Schools in 2006-2007.

The Canadian Red Cross "RespectED: Violence and Abuse Prevention" program was piloted at the secondary level in 2005-2006. Participants learn skills that help them develop healthy relationships at home, at school and in the community. The program focuses on all types of harassment and bullying, the abuse of power and authority, the rights and responsibilities of individuals, and intervention and prevention strategies to build safe and healthy communities. The program was expanded to all secondary schools in 2006-2007, as a key component of the Empowered Student Partnership (ESP) initiative. Under the ESP program, students identify concerns in their schools and initiate projects to promote safe school environments.

Graffiti Eradication Day



Students in Rainbow Schools rolled up their sleeves on June 14, 2006 to eradicate graffiti in their respective school communities. Students from Adamsdale Public School, Alexander Public School, Carl A. Nesbitt Public School, C.R. Judd Public School,

Jessie Hamilton Public School, Queen Elizabeth Public School, MacLeod Public School, Confederation Secondary School and Sudbury Secondary School were among the first to sign up for the "Adopt-A-Block" campaign. Students painted over existing graffiti and maintained a graffiti free environment in and around their respective schools. The program was expanded in 2006-2007.

First Aid training

First Aid training was provided during the Professional Learning Day on November 25, 2005 as part of the Board's priority to maintain safe schools. A number of employees, including Educational Assistants and secretarial staff, obtained First Aid certification.



Challenge Day

Over 200 teens and 25 adult facilitators participated in Challenge Day at Manitoulin Secondary School on February 28 and March 1, 2006, an innovative and highly experiential program designed to break down barriers and promote school/community environments based on understanding, acceptance, and love. Challenge Day was sponsored by the United Chiefs and Council of Manitoulin (UCCM) Justice Program, UCCM Mnaamodzawin Health, UCCM Police Services, Manitoulin Secondary School and Rainbow District School Board.

Pandemic preparations

Work began on a comprehensive influenza pandemic plan in co-operation with educational partners, the City of Greater Sudbury and the Sudbury & District Health Unit. The plan outlines the actions to be taken by the Board in the event of a pandemic. The Board also participated in community-wide training sessions.

Encourage Community Involvement

Parent Involvement Committee

When the Ministry of Education mandated the creation of a Board-wide committee to engage parents in 2005-2006, the longestablished School Council Co-ordinating Committee became the Parent Involvement Committee (PIC).

Chaired by Ruth Ward, the Committee provided a regular opportunity for School Council members to network, share ideas, offer input and enjoy informative presentations on a number of education related topics throughout the school year.


The Parent Involvement Committee also supported the Board's new website with content input and funding.

Rainbow District School Board was designated a pilot board for a Specialist High Skills Major in mining and business.

New visual identity



Rainbow District School Board adopted a new visual identity for Rainbow Schools in July 2006. The logo, in two colors, is more cost-effective

to reproduce. Work began on visual identity standards to ensure consistency in application across the Board.

- The symbol: The apple is a long-standing emblem of the relationship between teacher and learner. The rainbow carved out of the apple and the series of pathways in the form of rainbows reflect the essence of Rainbow Schools - leaders in learning inspiring success for all students. Students enter Rainbow Schools in Kindergarten and journey forward towards their destination of choice - independent living, work, apprenticeship, college and/or university. The pathways continue into infinity, a symbol of lifelong learning and learning for life. The three lines that form the stem of the apple represent the Board's vast geographic coverage area (Sudbury, Espanola, Manitoulin), the levels of learning (Elementary, Secondary, Continuing Education), and the programs offered (English, Core French, French Immersion). The parallel lines illustrate equality and diversity in public education - the foundation for a democratic, prosperous, humane, just and respectful society.
- The colour: The logo is two variations of blue. The symbol, a vibrant and versatile sky blue, provides a perfect canvas for the stylized rainbows. The word mark, a traditional and timeless navy blue, offers maximum legibility for Rainbow Schools. The colours of the rainbow come to life through the integration of four additional colours - red and yellow (primary colours) and purple and green (secondary colours.)
- * The slogan: The slogan captures the Rainbow District School Board's mission – to provide quality programs (reaching minds) and character education (touching hearts), which enable students in Rainbow Schools to maximize their potential and fulfill their aspirations. Quality programs ensure student success in all pathways. Character education builds good citizens who can lead us into the future.

Building professional learning communities



Dr. Tom Many was the keynote speaker during a session on "The Power of Professional Learning Communities" as part of the Leaders in Learning Conference held on

March 30, 2006. The Leaders in Learning Conference was a 2006 Innovation Fund proposal.

Professional Learning Communities have six key characteristics: shared mission, vision, values, and goals; collaborative teams; collective inquiry; action orientation/experimentation; commitment to continuous improvement and results orientation. In Professional Learning Communities, educators use data to make decisions about how students are learning.

This was one of many professional learning sessions held in 2005-2006.

Innovation Fund

Employees were invited to submit innovative ideas through the Innovation Fund program, which entered it second year in 2005-2006. Projects included podcasting, the development of web pages for expert panel reports, the use of MP3 players to engage students, a new Learning to 18 program at Cambrian College, videos for students with special needs, and the second phase of the successful Pay it Forward character education initiative.



Ergonomics study

An ergonomics study of workstations and equipment was completed at the Board Office in 2005-2006. This was part of the Board's efforts to encourage employee wellness.

Employee Induction Program

New employees participated in a full day Orientation Session at the beginning of the 2005-2006 school year. New employees had an opportunity to meet the senior admin team and learn more about the Board's vision, mission, values and priorities. They also received important information about policies, procedures and health and safety.



New Teacher Induction Program

Over 50 permanent new teachers joined Rainbow District School Board when classes began on September 6, 2005. They received special support during their first year in the profession as participants in the Board's New Teacher Induction Program.

Pairing new teachers with experienced teachers as mentors throughout the year is a key component of the program. The New Teacher Induction Program helps to attract, support and retain a highly competent teaching staff. It also helps to improve teaching practices among new and experienced teachers. This has a direct impact on student learning in Rainbow Schools.

In addition to mentoring, the Teacher Induction Program includes a series of workshops on topics such as effective planning, classroom management, and organization. New teachers receive a binder with resource information. They also meet with their mentors throughout the year, for job shadowing, coaching and planning.

Apple Award

tremendous pride and praise to Rainbow Schools. Norm McIntosh is the first recipient of the Rainbow District School Board Apple Award.

Maximize the Use of Technology

Using data to enhance student achievement



The Board began implementing the Managing Information for Student Achievement (MISA) plan. MISA provides a uniform method for school boards to collect, analyze and use data.

New student information system

A new student information system was introduced in all schools by the end of August 2006, giving schools access to information in real time. eSIS combined elementary and secondary data into one centrally maintained system, providing for the seamless transfer of student information from school to school. Teacher training workshops focused on the mark book, report card, curriculum tracking and attendance features of the new system. The Board began phasing in eSIS in the 2004-2005 school year.

Network infrastructure upgrade

Phase 2 of the three-year secondary school network infrastructure upgrade was completed.

Connecting people and places

The Board made greater use of video conferencing and web streaming to facilitate professional learning across its vast geographic coverage area. In addition, the Orientation Session for School Councils was video conferenced to Espanola and Manitoulin.



School Council members in Espanola and Manitoulin also had an opportunity to attend their first virtual Parent Involvement Committee meeting in the spring of 2006.

Assistive technology in special education

Rainbow District School Board participated in the launch of the new "Bridges to Learning" Assistive Technology Room at the main branch of the Greater Sudbury Public Library on October 19, 2005. Two computers loaded with the latest assistive technology software are now available to assist individuals with learning disabilities. The "Bridges to Learning" Assistive Technology Lab is an extension of the Learning Disabilities Association of Sudbury's partnership with the library and the



community, including Rainbow Schools.



Educational Assistants were introduced to assistive technology for students with special needs during the Professional Learning Day on November 25, 2005. Participants received a demonstration of Smart Ideas, Kurzweil and Dragon Naturally Speaking.

Using technology to engage students

Ronda Lenti and Pete Levan of Lockerby Composite School's laptop program took teachers on a dynamic digital literacy tour during the Professional Learning Day on November 25, 2005. They demonstrated how technology is used effectively to enhance the development of literacy skills. MP3 players and blogs, part of this new era of learning, are complementing and enhancing traditional teaching methods. Above all, technology is engaging students in new and innovative ways.

Some schools began using SMART boards in select classrooms. SMART boards allow students and teachers to interact in real time. They engage students in their learning and provide a powerful tool to respond to individual learning styles and accommodate special needs.

FM systems in Grade 1, 2, 3 classrooms

FM sound field systems have been installed in all Grade 1, 2 and 3 classrooms in both English and French Immersion programs. FM systems give students a front row seat on learning by optimizing classroom sound quality and creating a more intimate environment for learning.

Staff and students from C.R. Judd Public School in Capreol were featured in a documentary film about the use of sound field systems in the classroom. The company producing the documentary wanted to include one Canadian School District in the project. Phonic Ear recommended the Rainbow Board.

Maintain Quality Facilities

New French Immersion school in Valley East



Following an extensive public consultation process, the Board approved the construction of a new school in the growing community of Valley East – the first new school for

the Board in over 20 years. Being built on the existing site of Valley View Public School, the school will house JK to Grade 1 students from Val Caron Public School and Grade 2 to 8 students from Valley View Public School. The school will open in September 2007 with a projected enrolment of 500 students in the French

Immersion program.

The age of the existing schools, coupled with the large amount of capital required to renew the facilities, made building new the best option. Val Caron Public School will close effective June 2007.



The new school will be barrier-free and have space for smaller class sizes in the primary grades as well as physical education, instrumental music, visual arts, computer technology, a library and special education. There will also be space for a before and



after school program and a full daycare in response to community needs. The building will incorporate national Go Green environmental certification principles making it energy

efficient and more cost-effective to operate.

Ameresco Canada is overseeing the estimated \$15 million construction project on behalf of the Board. Rainbow District School Board trustees approved a plan to finance the school at the regular Board meeting held on June 12, 2006. The School Valuation Committee evaluated the benefits of a new school for students, the community, the local economy and the public school system. Public input meetings were held on January 19, February 9 and March 2, 2006. The Committee presented its report to the Board on March 20, 2006. The new school was approved at the regular Board meeting held on May 23, 2006.

The School Valuation Committee was comprised of trustees, the superintendent of the school, three school council representatives, the principal and vice-principal, a local municipal representative and a representative from the local business community.

Capital Plan

The five-year accommodation/capital plan was developed in accordance with Ministry of Education requirements. The plan is updated annually.

Good Places to Learn

Under the first phase of the Province's Good Places to Learn initiative, Rainbow District School Board received approval to obtain \$11.2 million in Ministry financing for capital projects. Two examples of projects completed in 2005-2006 and funded, in part, through this initiative include new windows at Lo-Ellen Park Secondary School and a new plumbing system at Lockerby Composite School. Substantial energy savings are being achieved as a result of these upgrades.

Upgrades to schools



The Board continued to improve accessibility in keeping with the Ontario Disabilities Act, including a new elevator at Lively District Secondary School. Fencing was installed and repaired

at various schools. Asphalt around school buildings was repaired and replaced. Playing fields were upgraded at Lo-Ellen Park Secondary School and Lasalle Secondary School. The sound and lighting systems in the Lockerby Composite School Auditorium were upgraded.

Focus on Sustainability

Sustainable development with Chuck Hopkins



Espanola High School graduate Chuck Hopkins, who has gained an international reputation, shared his vision for sustainable development with educators from

Rainbow Schools during a full-day workshop on January 19, 2006. He focused on three perspectives – global change (the environmental side), globalization (the economic component) and human development (the social factor).

Chuck Hopkins is Executive Director of the Dearness Environmental Society, a non-profit institution that works with school boards across Ontario to manage energy, water and waste more efficiently. He is also a UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) Chair at York University where he co-ordinates an international network of 36 education institutions from 34 countries to refocus teacher education to address sustainability. He is currently developing regional centres of expertise in education for sustainable development in 14 countries around the world.

School-based action plans

Drawing on ideas presented at the sustainable development workshop, educators developed sustainability plans for their respective schools. The action plans are all encompassing. Some schools are transforming school grounds in order to promote green spaces and take advantage of sunlight and shade. Others are looking to alter the set up of their classrooms to capitalize on available light. Others are opting to undertake certain tasks at non-peak times when energy use is less costly.



Rainbow Schools go green

Rainbow District School Board officially launched an Interactive Home Audit on June 19, 2006, designed to educate residents about the amount of energy being consumed in their homes and ways they can achieve savings. The audit can be completed online at rainbowschools.ca.

The website features an odometer that simulates energy use in Rainbow Schools - including water, electricity, gas and oil – by consumption and costs. Through the Interactive Home Audit, residents can track how much they are spending on energy and water on a month-by-month basis. They can also calculate how much money they could save by implementing efficiency measures in their homes. In addition to the Home Audit, the

Rainbow District School Board's environmental website features teacher resources, student resources, educational links, curriculum based lessons for elementary and secondary schools and success stories.



Significant savings achieved

Over the past five years, Rainbow Schools have undertaken a number of environmental initiatives with tremendous success. In collaboration with the Dearness Environmental Society and Earthcare Sudbury, administrators, custodians, teachers and students are learning together how to adopt a conservation ethic in their schools and take leadership in transferring this learning to their homes and communities.

Student-run activities such as turning off lights and computers, closing taps and making garbageless lunches are saving energy, water and reducing waste. Rainbow District School Board achieved approximately \$130,000 in savings in utilities in the 2004-2005 school year and \$341,000 in savings in the 2005-2006 school year. Savings achieved are being reinvested in schools.
