Information for Bus High-Risk Contacts of a Case of COVID-19

An individual who attended the **route N409 PM** has tested positive for COVID-19 and your child/student/driver has been identified as a potential close contact.

Someone is considered a close contact if there is a chance that they had a high-risk exposure to someone who tested positive for COVID-19. This does not mean that they have COVID-19 but are at higher risk of getting infected with the virus. Not everyone who is a close contact will develop an infection, however, the directions in this letter will help protect them and others from COVID-19.

If your child/driver/student currently have or develop **any of the following symptoms (even if mild)**, they must immediately **isolate**, get **tested** as soon as possible, and follow directions below.

Do not hesitate to get tested.

- Fever and/or chills (temperature of 37.8 degrees Celsius / 100 degrees Fahrenheit)
- Cough or barking cough (croup)
- Shortness of breath
- Decrease or loss of taste or smell
- Nausea, vomiting and/or diarrhea
- Fatigue
- Muscle aches and pain
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Abdominal pain
- Headache
- Conjunctivitis (pink eye)
- Decreased or lack of appetite
- Worsening of chronic health problems.

Please note that a legally enforceable [Class Order under the Health Protection and Promotion Act](#), is currently in effect. It requires all individuals in Public Health Sudbury & Districts' service area who are either a case, potential case or contact of a case, to follow Public Health direction.

It is critical that you carefully follow the Public Health direction in this letter. If the isolation period changes or is extended, you will be notified by letter from Public Health.

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There are different rules for people who are fully immunized and those who are not. Public Health’s direction is based on your immunization status.

Please follow the scenario applicable to the child/driver’s situation.

Note that for this situation, the **day 7 date is Dec 9** and the **day 10 date is Dec 12**, as referred to in the table below

1. Instructions for Testing and Isolation - Fully immunized or Previously Positive

If the child/driver is not immunocompromised and has been **fully immunized**¹ for COVID-19 or was a **confirmed positive**² case within the last 90 days, this section applies to them.

Public Health direction:

	Fully vaccinated or previously positive child/driver who has any <u>symptom of COVID-19</u> (listed above)	Fully vaccinated or previously positive child/driver who does <u>not have any symptoms of COVID-19</u> (listed above)
When should the child/driver get tested?	<p>Seek PCR test <u>immediately</u>.</p> <p>Rapid Antigen Tests are NOT to be used as they are only for screening purposes for individuals without symptoms and who are not contacts of a case. COVID-19 assessment centres are listed below.</p> <p>If they test negative, a repeat test is recommended on or after day 7.</p>	<p>Seek PCR testing <u>as soon as possible</u>.</p> <p>Rapid Antigen Tests are NOT to be used as they are only for screening purposes for individuals without symptoms and who are not contacts of a case. COVID-19 assessment centres are listed below.</p> <p>If the individual tests negative, seek a repeat test or after day 7.</p> <p>If they develop any symptoms (even mild), they must <u>test</u> and <u>isolate</u> immediately while awaiting their test results and follow instructions for child/driver with symptoms.</p>

¹ An individual is fully immunized if at least 14 days prior to their high-risk exposure they have received:

- the full series of a COVID-19 vaccine authorized by Health Canada, or any combination of such vaccines; OR
- one or two doses of a COVID-19 vaccine not authorized by Health Canada, followed by one dose of a COVID-19 mRNA vaccine authorized by Health Canada; OR
- three doses of a COVID-19 vaccine not authorized by Health Canada.

² An individual is considered previously positive if they tested positive for COVID-19 in the last 90 days and have since been cleared from their infection.

	<p>Fully vaccinated or previously positive child/driver who has any <u>symptom</u> of COVID-19 (listed above)</p>	<p>Fully vaccinated or previously positive child/driver who does <u>not</u> have any <u>symptoms</u> of COVID-19 (listed above)</p>
<p>Does the child/driver need to isolate?</p>	<p>They are required to <u>isolate</u> while awaiting their test results.</p> <p>If they test negative, they can stop isolating, but should continue to stay home until they have no fever and symptoms have been improving for at least 24 hours, or 48 hours for gastrointestinal symptoms (e.g. vomiting, diarrhea). However, they are <u>not permitted</u> to participate in extra-curricular activities with the school or in the community up to and including day 10.</p> <p>If they test positive, the child/driver and all household members isolate immediately regardless of vaccination status. Public Health will contact you within 24 hours to advise on testing and self-isolation for all household members.</p>	<p>They are <u>not required to isolate</u> while waiting for test results or if they test negative, and as long as they remain asymptomatic.</p> <p>They are <u>not permitted</u> to participate in extra-curricular activities within the school or in the community up to and including day 10. This is to be followed even if they test negative.</p> <p>If they develop any symptoms (even mild), they must test and <u>isolate</u> immediately while awaiting their test results and follow instructions for child/driver with symptoms.</p> <p>If they test positive, the child/driver and all household members isolate immediately regardless of vaccination status. Public Health will contact you within 24 hours to advise on testing and self-isolation for all household members.</p>
<p>When can the child/driver return to school/daycare/work?</p>	<p>If they test negative, they can return once they have no fever and symptoms have been improving for at least 24 hours, or 48 hours for gastrointestinal symptoms (e.g. vomiting, diarrhea). However, they are <u>not permitted</u> to participate in extra-curricular activities with the school or in the community up to and including day 10.</p> <p>If they test positive, they can return following the self-isolation period that will be communicated by Public Health.</p> <p>If they do not get tested, they must continue to isolate and cannot return to school until you contact Public Health to attain further direction on their return date.</p> <p>Contact your school/work to find out when in-person instruction will resume for this class/cohort, if applicable.</p>	<p>Immediately, unless otherwise directed by Public Health. However, they are <u>not permitted</u> to participate in extra-curricular activities within the school or in the community up to and including day 10. This is to be followed even if they test negative.</p> <p>If they test positive, they can return following the self-isolation period that will be communicated by Public Health.</p> <p>If they do not get tested, they can return to school/daycare/work as long as they remain asymptomatic.</p> <p>Contact your school/work to find out when in-person instruction will resume for this class/cohort, if applicable.</p>

	Fully vaccinated or previously positive child/driver who has any <u>symptom</u> of COVID-19 (listed above)	Fully vaccinated or previously positive child/driver who does <u>not</u> have any <u>symptoms</u> of COVID-19 (listed above)
When do household members need to self-isolate?	<p>Household members need to self-isolate if either of the following two conditions apply. If neither applies, household members do not need to self-isolate.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. All household members must self-isolate if the child/driver tests positive regardless of household members' immunization status or if previously positive for COVID-19 (Public Health will contact you within 24 hours); <u>OR</u> 2. For household members who are not fully vaccinated or previously positive for COVID-19, they must self-isolate if the child/driver is symptomatic and is waiting for test results. Fully immunized household members do not need to self-isolate. <p>Please refer to these directions COVID-19: What to do if your child is dismissed from school or childcare</p>	

2. Instructions for Testing and Isolation – Not Fully Immunized or Previously Positive

If the child/driver is immunocompromised or has **NOT been fully immunized**³ or was **not a previously positive**⁴ case within the last 90 days, this section applies to them.

Public Health direction:

	Child/driver who is not fully vaccinated or not previously positive
When should the child/driver get tested?	<p>If child/driver has any COVID-19 symptoms (even if mild - see list above), seek PCR testing immediately. If they test negative, seek a repeat test on or after day 7.</p> <p>If child/driver does not have any symptoms, seek PCR testing on or after day 7.</p> <p>Rapid Antigen Tests are NOT to be used as they are only for screening purposes for individuals without symptoms and who are not contacts of a case). COVID-19 assessment centers are listed below.</p>

³ An individual is **not fully immunized** if at least 14 days prior to their high-risk exposure they have **not** received:

- the full series of a COVID-19 vaccine authorized by Health Canada, or any combination of such vaccines; OR
- one or two doses of a COVID-19 vaccine not authorized by Health Canada, followed by one dose of a COVID-19 mRNA vaccine authorized by Health Canada; OR
- three doses of a COVID-19 vaccine not authorized by Health Canada.

⁴ An individual is **not previously positive** in the last 90 days if they have not tested positive for COVID-19 in the last 90 days and been cleared of their infection

	Child/driver who is not fully vaccinated or not previously positive
Does the child/driver need to isolate?	<p>They are required to <u>self-isolate</u> immediately following notification that they were considered a close contact to someone who tested positive for COVID-19</p> <p>If they test negative and if they have no new or worsening symptoms, they must continue to <u>self-isolate</u> up to and including day 10. They may stop self-isolating after day 10.</p> <p>If they experience new or worsening symptoms after their negative test, contact Public Health for further assessment and direction.</p> <p>If they test positive, continue to <u>self-isolate</u>. Public Health will contact you within 24 hours to advise you of the date that their isolation will end in addition to further information you require for their self-isolation.</p>
When can the child/driver return to school/daycare/work?	<p>If they test negative, and provided no new or worsening symptoms, they can return after day 10 as long as at that time they have no fever and symptoms have been improving for at least 24 hours, or 48 hours for gastrointestinal symptoms (e.g., vomiting, diarrhea).</p> <p>If they test positive, they can return following the self-isolation period that will be communicated by Public Health.</p> <p>If they do not get tested and had any symptoms (even mild) within their 10-day self-isolation period, they must continue to isolate and contact Public Health to attain further direction on their return date.</p> <p>If they do not get tested and had no symptoms for their <u>entire</u> 10-day self-isolation period, they can return after day 10.</p>
When do household members need to self-isolate?	<p>Household members need to self-isolate if any of the following conditions apply. If none apply, household members do not need to self-isolate.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. All household members must self-isolate if the child/driver tests positive regardless of household members' immunization status or if previously positive for COVID-19 (Public Health will contact you within 24 hours); <u>OR</u> 2. For household members who are not fully vaccinated or previously positive for COVID-19, they must self-isolate if the child/driver is symptomatic and is waiting for test results. Fully immunized household members do not need to self-isolate; <u>OR</u> 3. For household members who are not fully vaccinated and are attending daycare or are elementary or secondary school aged children, they must stay away from school and not gather with unvaccinated persons outside of their household until after day 10. <p>Please refer to these directions COVID-19: What to do if your child is dismissed from school or childcare</p>

If you are concerned about new or worsening symptoms of COVID-19, contact Telehealth Ontario at 1.866.797.0000, or your health care provider.

Call 911 or take your child to the nearest hospital immediately if your child is experiencing any of the following symptoms:

- Severe difficulty breathing (struggling for each breath, can only speak in single words)
- Severe chest pain (constant tightness or crushing sensation)
- Feeling confused or unsure of where they are
- Losing consciousness
