Think about 4 examples of where you would see 100,000 items in real life e.g. people in a football stadium. Try other numbers.	Read: Read for 30 minutes. Writing: Explain how you figured out the order of the numbers below. Math: Put the following numbers in order from smallest to largest: 76 821, 28 100, 76 900, 100,000. Have an adult give you 4 more numbers up to 100,000.	Read: Read for 30 minutes. Writing: What is your favourite season? Why? Remember to introduce your topic, add details about the topic, and include a concluding sentence. Don't forget periods and capitals. Make sure all of your words are spelled correctly. Math: Multiplication: review 9's Addition and Subtraction: a) 3,499 + 5,001 = b) 8,923 - 5,402 = Have an adult give you 3 more questions.	Read: Read something different. Try a recipe in print or online. Writing: Write about your plans for the weekend. Remember to introduce your topic, add details about the topic, and include a concluding sentence. Don't forget periods and capitals. Make sure all of your words are spelled correctly. Math: Start at 3,621 and count up by thousands until you get to 64,621.

Writing: Try an online keyboarding program or type 5 to 10 sentences about your goals for this year.  Math: Write numbers in expanded form e.g. 40,672 = 40,000 + 0 + 600 + 70 + 2 Try more numbers up to 500,000.
