1.10 Funds

Funds raised over the past 3 years (details)

We organize 2 major fundraising campaigns per year. A walk-a-thon in October and a Car Wash/B.B.Q/Yard Sale in May generates a total profit of approximately \$3000. Food and book orders also raise an additional \$1000. We also have a Nevada program in cooperation with a local business which raises about \$2500/yr. for field trip transportation costs. Pepperette, chocolate, and magazine subscriptions have also raised over \$1,200 annually. These are funds raised specifically for the school; see below funds raised for the community. On a three year basis, over \$22,000 has been raised locally to benefit the school community of R.H. Murray.

Corporate donations over the past 3 years (details)

City of Greater Sudbury facilities – rental of site waived \$400 Lions Club of Whitefish – books – \$1,500 Donations from local businesses and organizations to graduating class. Approximate value of \$750 annually. Total value of corporate support over the last three years is approximately \$7000.

1.11 Summary

Why do students choose this school?

This is the only school period in an over 400 square kilometer area. This school is chosen over St. James in Lively because it provides students with a more intimate learning environment. Students feel safe at R.H. Murray. Students appreciate the closeness of our school community. The distances traveled to school are acceptable to our families. For many families in our area, busing to Lively would be ridiculously long. Students enjoy the activities we celebrate as attention to character development and academics.

What is unique about this school?

We have a small family oriented school with a strong academic focus as demonstrated in our EQAO results. We have piano and guitar lessons offered in-school by community volunteers. R.H. Murray is the only elementary public school that enrolls students from the Whitefish Lake First Nation. Students have such familiarity with and accountability to one another (i.e., grade eight students know many of the kindergarten students and their families.) Our bus drivers know the students and their parents and avert potential problems by communicating directly with parents.

What is the value of the school to students?

In a rural setting, school can be the only opportunity for social interaction and personal development. At R.H. Murray students participate in many different extra and intra -curricular activities. A child who may not make a team in a larger school will have the opportunity to do so at R.H. Murray. The students appreciate the emphasis on literacy and numeracy as indicated through social inclusion programs. More than 50% of staff live in the community and students appreciate being taught by teachers known throughout the community. Students with special needs are provided with excellent support. Students really enjoy using the excellent facilities such as the tennis and basketball courts as well as the soccer and baseball fields. Above all, students appreciate having access to a school in their own community.

Additional Comments:

In 2004 the highly touted Fraser Institute ranked R.H. Murray the top school in the City of Greater Sudbury and in the top 10% of all Ontario schools.

The school serves part of the former town of Walden and is the westernmost school in the City of Greater Sudbury, serving a geographical area of over 400 square kilometers.(see map attached) It is the only option available for those who support public education and all that that means. R.H. Murray's strong academic focus has brought great "P.R."to the Rainbow Board such as was the case when it received top ranking by the Fraser Institute.

This school also serves the students from Whitefish Lake First Nation; the only school to service an aboriginal community in the City of Greater Sudbury.

3.5 Summary

What is the value of the school to the community?

- The school acts as a meeting place for special events such as the Spring Tea, Christmas concert, graduations, and teen and parent meetings.
- R.H. Murray provides the larger rural community of western Sudbury with an educational facility and a community centre for the Whitefish area. (The nearest city facility is over 17 kilometers away – you must go to either Beaver Lake or the Town of Lively).
- The community of Whitefish can attract new development and young families into our area if there is a local school for their children to attend. This is the only school in a catchment area larger than 400 square kilometers.
- R.H. Murray provides opportunities for rural children to participate in a variety of activities –in both the academic and sports realms.
- The school is relied upon as a strong educational resource, and provides students with the opportunity for quality public education. R.H. Murray, although small, has students who have gone on to post secondary educational institutions at the masters and doctoral level. These individuals are now making important contributions throughout Sudbury, Ontario, and Canada.
- R.H. Murray is important to families not only for its academic program, but for its physical location as well. Members of R.H. Murray live outside the urban realm and the problems that can exist in that milieu. The possibility of industrial pollution accidents from our community's major employers is substantially less for our neighbouring schools. The school is located off major arterial roads, and is a safe place for children to play. Both of these points reiterate that parents feel this is a safe place for their children to be.

4.5 Growth/Reduction

List plans for further commercial/industrial growth/reduction?

CVRD INCO is opening Totten Mine for production in 2011 with 150 permanent workers (miners) and 250 construction/trades people (working now until 2011). First Nickel recently announced the discovery of a rich nickel/copper ore body at its Lockerby Mine. Xstrata is exploring a major nickel find near Agnew Lake. Lomin, a major world platinum producer, has interest in a find within Dennison Township. Service industry businesses are purchasing new equipment and hiring additional staff. These are all significant growth opportunities for the western part of the City of Greater Sudbury.

4.6 Summary

What is the value of the school to the local economy?

R.H. Murray Public School is critical to the future development and sustainability of this community, and the tax base it represents to both the Rainbow Board of Education and the City of Greater Sudbury. It lies within three major transportation routes and as such is a desirable place for industrial, commercial, and residential development. Without a local elementary school in this catchment area, this rural community's opportunity for growth will be severely hampered. The local real-estate market would be adversely affected if the school should ever close. Local businesses would then find it extremely difficult to survive. R.H. Murray Public School is the only school in a catchment area of over 400 square kilometers.
