



Ontario Building a New Elementary School in Sudbury

Province Investing in Success of Northern Ontario Students

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Ontario is building a new elementary school for 387 students in Sudbury and renovating four other area schools to provide the best possible learning environments. This will lay the groundwork for their future success and improve access to licensed child care for local families.

These new projects will provide students with modern facilities that support student learning and help the Rainbow District School Board reduce costs associated with under-used space. The new JK to Grade 6 elementary school will accommodate students from Carl A Nesbitt, Ernie Checkeris, and Westmount Avenue Public School and also house three child care rooms and one child and family program room.

Renovation projects will be completed at four other area schools, including:

- A gym addition for Confederation Secondary School.
- Churchill Public School to accommodate incoming students from Cyril Varney Public School.
- Chelmsford Valley District Composite School to accommodate students from Chelmsford Public School and Grades 7 and 8 students from Larchwood Public School.
- Using underutilized rooms for new child care spaces at Levack Public School.

These projects are part of the largest infrastructure investment in schools, hospitals, public transit, roads and bridges in Ontario's history. To learn more about what's happening in your community, go to Ontario.ca/BuildON.

QUICK FACTS

- Ontario is investing more than \$23 million to support Rainbow District School Board in completing these infrastructure projects.
- Since 2011, Rainbow District School Board and Sudbury Catholic District School Board have received capital funding totalling \$170 million from the Province. These investments are supporting the construction of 11 projects, including four new schools.
- Since 2013, Ontario has invested \$9.3 billion in capital funding for school boards to support 121 new schools and 144 additions and renovations.
- The Province is helping 100,000 more children access quality, licensed child care in schools, homes, and communities over the next five years.
- Ontario is investing \$1.6 billion in new capital funding to support the creation of 45,000 new licensed child care spaces in schools, other public spaces and communities over the next five years.

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
