1. 2022-2023 School Year Update

Director Bourget shared an update for the 2022-2023 school year and the implementation of the board's Strategic Directions, through our priorities and values.

We launched the school year with the focus on Community and many examples of how our schools demonstrated what community meant to them were shared, including the Lasalle-Finlandia SISU walk, Terry Fox Runs and Winter Clothing Drive. The focus this month is on resilience and how our mental, emotional and physical health contribute.

However, OPSBA and a number of individual Boards are holding discussions about the Ministry directive. While there are still ongoing discussions, our Board can continue to complete the 2021-22 financials and will comply with the final decision that is made.

3. Governance By-Law 3: Organizational Meeting

- 3.1. The annual organizational meeting of the Board in a municipal election year will be held as per the Municipal Elections Act, 1996 and the Education Act.
- 3.1.1. In a non-election year, the Organizational and Regular meetings of the Board will be combined at the December meeting. In each following year, the Board shall hold its organizational meeting at the first meeting on or after the anniversary of the date of the term of office the board began.
- 3.2. At such meetings at the appointed time, the Secretary shall call the meeting to order.
- 3.3. At the annual organizational meeting of the Board in a municipal election year, the Secretary will call the meeting to order and read the election returns as certified by the Clerks of the Municipalities. These Clerks act as Returning Officers for the election of Trustees of Rainbow District School Board.
- 3.3.1. The Secretary shall certify that the members have met all procedural requirements and are eligible to take office.
- 3.4. The First Nations' representative shall be appointed as a member of the Board by recorded motion.
- 3.5. Prior to taking office, members will make a declaration as referred to in the *Education Act* and take an Oath of Allegiance as referred to in the *Education Act*.
- 3.6. With the Secretary presiding, or in his/her absence, a temporary Chairperson chosen by open vote of the Board, the Board shall proceed to elect a Chairperson by secret ballot for the ensuing year.
- 3.6.1. The Secretary or temporary Chairperson shall name the scrutineers.
- 3.6.2. The Secretary or temporary Chairperson shall call for nominations and seconders for the position of Chairperson.
- 3.6.3. Of those nominated and agreeing to allow their names to stand for election, the member receiving a clear majority of the votes cast by all members present shall be declared elected. The count shall not be declared. If no member receives a clear majority of the



GOVERNANCE BY-LAWS

votes cast on the first ballot, the scrutineers will announce the result. The name receiving the fewest votes will be dropped and balloting will continue until a majority of votes are in favour of one person. If the final two candidates receive an equal number of votes, the drawing of lots will fill the position.

- 3.6.4. The person declared Chairperson shall take the Chair at once and preside over the meeting.
- 3.7. The Board shall elect a Vice-Chairperson and the procedure will be as for the election of the Chairperson.
- 3.8. Membership on the various Board Standing Committees shall be determined immediately following the election of the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson. If required, members shall be chosen by secret ballot.
- 3.8.1. Board Standing Committees shall consist of the Accessibility Planning Committee, Audit Committee, Environmental Committee, Equity and Inclusive Education Committee, First Nation Advisory Committee, Labour Relations Committee, Parental Involvement Committee, School Year Structure Committee, Special Education Advisory Committee, Strategic Planning Committee, Student Senate, Supervised Alternative Learning Committee.
- 3.8.2. Board Standing Committees shall be defined as per Appendix A.
- 3.9. The Board shall elect its representative(s) to the Ontario Public School Boards' Association (OPSBA).
- 3.10. The Chairperson shall direct the scrutineers to destroy any and all ballots used during the elections by recorded motion.



GOVERNANCE BY-LAWS

6. Governance By-Law 6: Duties of Chairperson And Vice Chairperson

- 6.1. The Chairperson of the Board is the official spokesperson for the Board, on matters which reflect the will of the Board through resolution.
- 6.2. The Chairperson of the Board, or in his/her absence, the Vice-Chairperson, shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He/she will call the meeting to order at the hour appointed and shall preserve order and decorum and decide upon all questions of order. He/she shall cause the Recording Secretary to record the names of all members present and absent.
- 6.3. In the event of the position of Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson becoming permanently vacant, a new Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson shall be elected at the next Regular Board meeting in the same manner as before provided. (See By-Law 3)
- 6.4. In case of the absence of both the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson for ten minutes after the hour of the commencement of any meeting, as soon as a quorum shall be present, the Board under the direction of the Secretary, shall choose a temporary Chairperson.
- 6.5. The temporary Chairperson shall preside only until the Chairperson or Vice-Chairperson arrives and the immediate business at hand is completed.
- 6.6. The Chairperson shall declare the result of each vote.
- 6.7. The Chairperson shall be an ex-officio member of all Board committees with the exception of the audit committee. He/she has the same voting rights as other committee members, is not counted in calculating the number necessary for a quorum, but does count at a committee meeting to provide that quorum.
- 6.8. The Chairperson shall not take part in any discussion regarding a motion unless he/she first leaves the Chair and appoints someone to take his/her place until the motion is decided.
- 6.9. The Chairperson shall vote with other members of the Board.
- 6.10. The Chairperson shall sign all minutes approved by the Board.
- 6.11. The Chairperson shall decide when a question is to be put to a vote.

Education advocacy at large

OSTA-AECO is an active partner in Ontario's education system and the largest student stakeholder group in Ontario, representing approximately 2 million students. The General Assembly is comprised of student trustees from public and Catholic school boards across Ontario. Members of the organization work tirelessly throughout the year to advocate for student voice and strive to work with our partners in government and otherwise to improve Ontario's education system for our students. Advocacy initiatives

Student trustees gain valuable experiences through the professional development opportunities offered by OSTA-AECO. Through this unique network of passionate and motivated student leaders, members of OSTA-AECO engage in meaningful discussions with partners in publicly funded education and the Ministry of Education. In doing so, student trustees continue to advocate on behalf of students in the province. Some examples of the initiatives and projects that our organization has taken on in the 2021–2022 academic year include:



The Student Blueprint

A summary document of our organization's past recommendations from five previous publications. These include The Student Platform, The Students' Visions for Education, eLearning: The Students' Perspective, and the three-part series The Volume of Our Voices.

Open Letter to Catholic School Boards in Support of 2SLGBTQ+ Students

The Catholic Board Council released an open letter to Directors of Education, Trustees, and staff of Ontario Catholic School Boards expressing support for members of the 2SLGBTQ+ community, with a list of five recommendations to support them and tackle anti-2SLGBTQ+ discrimination and bullying.

Menstrual Equity Advocacy

The Executive Council worked with the Minister of Education and the provincial government to ensure that students who menstruate have access to the menstrual hygiene products that they need in schools, at no cost to them or their families.

Student Trustee Handbook with OPSBA

The Public Board Council worked alongside the Ontario Public School Boards' Association (OPSBA) to develop a handbook for student trustees with resources related to school board governance and policies, their roles and responsibilities, best practices from other student trustees, and additional information.

OSTA-AECO's working groups are comprised of student trustees across Ontario. Student trustees have the opportunity to contribute to the development of initiatives across key areas, including:

Environmental Sustainability Working Group

Seeks to uphold a sense of environmental responsibility by educating students about the potential impacts of climate change and on how dependent we are on the health of our Earth for survival.

Indigenous Relations Working Group

Educates peers on the barriers Indigenous students in Ontario face today and supports the guidelines for reconciliation, as outlined by the Truth and Reconciliation Commision of Canada.

Communications Working Group

Crafts content to strengthen and promote OSTA-AECO's brand by generating creative content for social media platforms and designing visual assets for provincial campaigns. During conferences, this group aids in providing world-class professional development to student trustees as they transition into their roles.

French Relations Working Group

Works to identify the unique barriers students in French programming face and amplify the voices of our Francophone and/or Francophile students.

Student Well-Being Working Group

Gives students appropriate resources and tools to help destigmatize the culture surrounding both physical and mental illness.

Equity and Inclusion Working Group

Seeks to educate students on topics relating to equity (e.g. anti-racism, 2SLGBTQ+ issues, gender equity, etc.) and advocate for inclusive practices in Ontario education.

Ontario Student Voice Awards Working Group

Awards 6 scholarships a year to students across Ontario who have demonstrated academic excellence and exemplary community leadership.

OSTA-AECO's Working Groups play an essential role within our organization's collective advocacy. Last year alone, our Working Groups took part in a substantial amount of initiatives and projects regarding various aspects of our education system. These initiatives include:

- Our **French Relations Working Group** assisted in revising the French versions of an E-Learning concussion module by OPHEA, and planned a French Relations conference to gather Francophone student trustees and foster conversations about improving French education in Ontario.
- Our Student Well-Being Working Group provided students with various mental and physical wellbeing tips through OSTA-AECO's social media accounts yearround, and created a Menstrual Hygiene Accessibility Handbook that can be used for student trustees when lobbying school boards to provide students with free menstrual products.



Conferences and professional development

We provide student trustees with a unique opportunity to attend skills development workshops to set them up for success throughout their term. These sessions feature provincial leaders, industry professionals, and OSTA-AECO alumni. Student trustees also have an opportunity to network and work with their peers from across the province to identify areas of collaboration and advocate for students at the provincial level.

The Fall General Meeting focuses on:

- Skill development board table basics, professionalism, Robert's Rules, etc.
- In-depth focus on Ontario's education system and the role of the student trustee
- Resources to help student trustees find their voice at the board table
- Breakout sessions discussions and working group initiatives

RE: 2023 Premium Invoice

In 2022 we celebrate OSBIE's 35th year of operations. The insurance market has evolved greatly over the last three and a half decades, but OSBIE members have been protected by our conservative investment strategy and successful application of the reciprocal concept. The support of our members to focus on risk management has helped prevent injuries and protect school board properties.

Nonetheless, while our investment strategy helps us insulate our members from the ebbs and flows of the insurance market, we are not immune to fluctuations in the economy and reinsurance capacity. It is important to ensure that premiums are calculated accurately to protect the pool both today and in the future.

2023 General Rate changes

Rates are determined in anticipation of OSBIE's expected future cost of claims, current administration expenses, and where applicable, reinsurance costs. Following are the general rate changes set for 2023:

Liability	2.0%	rate increase
Property	12.0%	rate increase
Boiler	3.9%	rate increase
Auto	-5%	rate decrease
Cyber	50%	rate increase

Crime and legal expense coverages will renew with no rate change.

Why are rates increasing in some lines?

Property

Claims frequency has increased by as much as 30%. Severity has increased substantially as well, driven by losses due to winter storms, fire, and water with an incurred amount of \$7.9 million.

Another factor that is impacting the rate increase for property, one being the increasing cost of construction. The 3 components that are causing this increase in Canada are:

- 1. Material delays both locally and globally
- 2. Labour shortages trying to find experienced, qualified labour
- 3. Weather such as heavy rains followed by dry spells, windstorms, etc.

Given the results on this line of business, there was no premium refund to members in the property group this year.

Reinsurance is an important mechanism to ensure there is adequate protection for this pool. As we are in an age of big data, we have the opportunity to improve the quality and quantity of information about our members' properties, and we are already working with members to achieve this goal. This data will assist in demonstrating to reinsurers that school boards are an attractive risk.

<u>Cyber</u>

Cyber results have diminished globally over the past several years which has resulted in decreased insurance coverage for many organizations. Organizations fortunate enough to obtain a policy are experiencing coverage restrictions and lower limits as well as increased premiums and retentions, leaving those that have had losses struggling to find coverage. Now is the time, more than ever, to invest in cyber security and incident response. This year's rate change was determined in part by reviewing the increasing cost of claims, which have increased by 1,178% since the inception of the program in 2015.
