### **Bill 98:**

### **Better Schools & Students Outcomes Act**

**Early Reading**: Ontario is introducing comprehensive early reading actions that include universal screening for students in Year 2 of Kindergarten to Grade 2, with intensive supports for students who need them.

**Math**: Ontario will continue its focus in math in response to the latest EQAO results to support students in meeting provincial math standards.

**Job-readiness:** Ontario is strengthening co-operative education opportunities and expanding job skill programs to ensure students have opportunities for hands-on learning in a variety of careers, including in the skilled trades.

**Mental Health:** Mental Health workers partner with educators, principals, and families to support students' continued learning and to provide direct early interventions to students struggling with mild to moderate mental health issues.

**Human Rights and Inclusion:** The ministry will continue to work with its partners in establishing and maintaining a world-class education system that sets high expectations for every student, and that will help to ensure equality of opportunity, meaningful experiences, and successful outcomes.

## **Bill 98:**

### **Better Schools & Students Outcomes Act**

**Special Education:** Ontario will continue to support students with special education needs and disabilities, so they have access to the supports they need to succeed in school and beyond.

**Student Safety:** Supports for students to help them address personal and academic challenges hindering learning achievement, as well as resources for youth to create meaningful connections and a sense of belonging within their schools and communities.

**Student Transportation:** The government is continuing with the new benchmark-based funding formula for student transportation.

Capital: Focusing on how to build modern schools faster, better utilize school capacity and enhance accountability & transparency.

# **Limitations Set by the Ministry of Education**

Education funding recognizes that school boards need flexibility to decide how best to allocate resources within their budgets.

At the same time there are limitations:

Provincial curriculum/programs shall be delivered to students.

Class size targets for both elementary and secondary classes are to be met.

Funding provided for Special Education shall be used for that purpose. Unspent funds must be placed in a Special Education reserve.

Funding intended for new schools or additions and for major repairs to schools must be used for those purposes. Unspent funds must be placed in a capital reserve.

School Board Administration and Governance spending shall not exceed the compliance threshold.

Funding under the Responsive Education Programs (REP) must be used as prescribed by the Ministry.

# **Limitations Set by the Ministry of Education**

Budgets must balance.

The use of reserve funds (Accumulated Surplus) to balance the budget is limited to the lessor of:

- the Board's Accumulated Surplus for the preceding year, and
- 1 percent of the Board's operating revenue

Ministry approval is required for the use of reserves that are in excess of these limits, prior to final approval of the budget.

## 2025/2026 Budget Establishment Criteria

Maintain current programs and services.

2025/2026 revised expenditure budget as a base, adjusted:

To exclude 2024/2025 one-time budgets

#### To include:

- the terms and conditions of employment in the extended collective agreements
- inflationary pressure
- statutory increases
- the 2025/2026 Special Education budget recommended by the Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) May 7, 2025 and approved by the Board May 20, 2025

## **Core Education Funding (CEF)**

#### **Classroom Staffing Fund (CSF)**

The classroom Staffing Fund supports the majority of staff that work in classrooms, including teachers, early childhood educators (ECEs) in kindergarten classrooms and some educational assistants (EAs). Note that the primary source of funding for EAs is the Special Education Fund.

#### **Learning Resources Fund (LRF)**

The Learning Resources Fund supports the costs of staffing typically required outside of the classroom to support student needs, such as teacher-librarians / library technicians, guidance counselors, mental health workers, school management staff as well as non-staffing classroom costs, such as learning materials and classroom equipment.

#### **Special Education Fund (SEF)**

The Special Education Fund supports positive outcomes for students with special education needs. This funding is for the additional costs of the programs, services and/or equipment these students may require.

## **Core Education Funding (CEF)**

#### **School Facilities Fund (SFF)**

The School Facilities Fund supports operating (including cleaning and utilities), maintaining, renovating and renewing school buildings. It also provides additional support for students in rural and northern communities.

#### **Student Transportation Fund (STF)**

The Student Transportation Fund supports the transportation of students between home and school.

#### **School Board Administration Fund (SBAF)**

The School Board Administration Fund supports governance and administration costs for the operation of the school board, including its board offices and facilities, as well as for parent engagement activities.

# Adjustments to Core Education Funding

#### **Interim Special Incidence Portion (SIP) Funding Approach**

In the 2025–26 school year, the ministry is continuing the SIP funding approach by using an interim formula to calculate the amount for each school board, as they continue to work towards a new approach for the future. Further details were provided this year regarding the calculation, which includes a base amount plus a per-pupil Exceptional Circumstances amount.

## **Modernization of Education and Community Partnership Program** (ECPP) Funding

Based on feedback from education sector partners across the province, the changes implemented are to better meet the needs of students, improve student outcomes, enhance access and the quality of education programs and reduce administrative burden.

There are now two funding components. The ECPP component and the Care and Treatment Education Programs (CTEP) component. The latter consists of a base amount plus a per-pupil amount. Further details have yet to be provided, but the Ministry has advised that this information should be available in the near future.

#### Regional Internal Audit Team (RIAT) Investment

Additional funding of \$2 million, province-wide, is being provided to enhance school board financial management through the RIAT component.

# Adjustments to Core Education Funding

#### **Compensation**

- Increases that reflect the final year of the 2022-2026 collective agreements and the third year of the 2023-2027 Principal and Vice-Principal terms and conditions, including:
  - \$1 per hour increase in education workers salaries
  - o 2.5% increase in teacher, principal and vice principal salaries
  - Net neutral change, where supply teacher benchmarks are increased but offset by the reduction in occasional teacher top up funding from 2024-25

#### **Non-Staff Benchmarks**

The ministry is providing a 2 per cent cost update to the non-staff portion of the School Operations Allocation benchmark to assist school boards in managing the increases in commodity prices (i.e., electricity, natural gas, maintenance/repair costs, insurance, and other costs).

#### **Census Data**

This is the second year of the five-year phase-in of updates reflecting the 2021 Statistics Canada census data, affecting components such as Remote and Rural, Demographic Needs and the Special Education Statistical Prediction Model.

# Adjustments to Core Education Funding

#### **Student Transportation**

The ministry is continuing with the new funding framework for Student Transportation Grant, including:

- updates to funding benchmarks to support the increasing costs of transportation services
- funding to cover costs associated with the non-refundable portion of HST
- top-up funding to ensure that each school board receives an increase of at least 2.5% over the 2024-25 initial allocation
- continued focus on optimization of transportation routing

# School Condition Improvement (SCI) & School Renewal Allocation (SRA)

The Ministry will invest \$1.4 billion in 2025/2026.

#### **Temporary Accommodations**

The Ministry will invest \$70 million in 2025/2026.

An additional \$545 million is allocated to support Accessibility Improvements and the replacement of Reinforced Autoclave Aerated Concrete (RAAC). No further details are available at this time.

School Renewal and School Condition index funding will now be recovered at the end of the province's year end (March 31), in the third year after the funding was in effect. Historically, the amounts were allowed to rollover indefinitely.

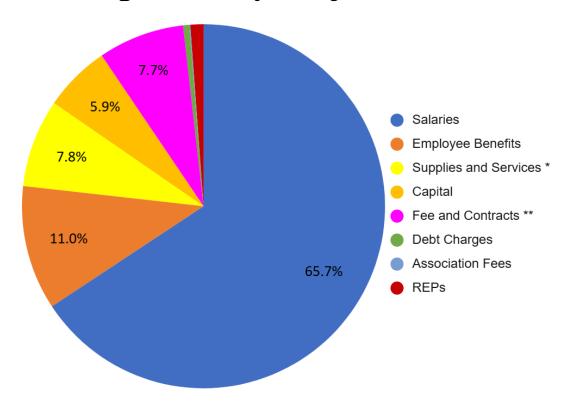

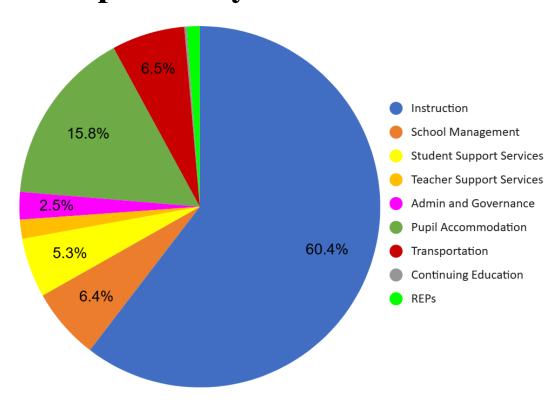
